- The British 21st L.A.A. Regiment, 79th Light Anti-Aircraft battery of Bofors gunners arrived from Java only a few days before the Japanese invaded Timor on 20th February 1942. Veterans of the Battle of Britain, they proved their mettle by downing up to 20 aircraft in only a few days. See Grant McLachlan's new site http://www.sparrowbook.com and his book.
- Peter Winstanley's website at www.pows-of-japan.net is regularly updated and a good source for material. Lieut.-Col. Peter Winstanley OAM RFT (retd.) was initially the key to contacting Sparrow Force members, making our documentary much more comprehensive.
- D.M. Wyatt OAM RFD has another great site at www.dmwyatt.com which is primarily dedicated to Tasmanian Military History. A retired Lt.-Col. Tasmanian infantry, Doug is well placed to advise of books, photographs and CDs. Other useful links are found on his site.
- Peter Dunn's <u>www.ozatwar.com</u> has pages devoted to some Sparrow Force units, *eg* 2/12th Field Ambulance. The site covers many other topics, a great resource for WWar 2 history.
- Rod Beattie's Thai Burma Railway museum at Kanchanaburi hosts a site on prisoners of war in South-East Asia, including Sparrow Force. Remains of those who died on the Death Railway are interred at the adjacent war cemetery. Research facilities are available; this museum, adjacent War Cemetery and Hellfire Pass is a must-see. www.tbronline.com

 One needs to choose the service (Army, Navy, Air Force, &c.) and enter the person's family name and christian name initials. Or the service number if known. Details can also be accessed via the place and date of enlistment however there is less liklihood knowing these.

- Japanese atrocities during WW2 continue to pop up in the course of our Sparrow Force research. Excuses are offered today by others than Japanese officials and government; such events are expunged from the Japanese school curriculum. Note that some details may require correction, *e.g.* issues to Sparrow Force on the Wikipedia Order of Battle page was corrected at our instigation, where firearms that had not even been issued in 1941-1944 were listed as being general issue to the British 79th L.A.A. Bofors units.

The Australian War Memorial likely has the largest collection of 2/40th and Sparrow Force records now. Some can be downloaded as .pdf files from their website, some may still be closed and require an application for the file to be inspected, made open and copied, while others are yet to be digitised. The 2/40th War Diaries have been digitised and are available: AWM52 Item 8/3/34 which covers July 1940 to January 1942. Some of these bi-monthly files are large and require a fast connection and/or a long wait.

More websites are likely to appear as interest in Sparrow Force grows. With a good search engine and keying in relevant words such as 'Sparrow Force', 'Timor', the years '1941' or '1942' along with any other words or names will reveal more detail. However, some figures and information may not necessarily agree with other records because of the different sources and ageing recollections of those men who served there.

U-tube is an ever expanding source for film records and it is another avenue for information on Sparrow Force. Again, keying appropriate words in the search engine can lead to many more hours of interesting viewing. Grant McLachlan has posted some interviews he did with Sparrow Force members, on U-tube.

Guided tours of East Timor are available now to follow the 2nd Independent Company's action from and after Dili. The former Dutch West Timor will also be more on the tour agenda after there is further interest in Sparrow Force history and its operations. On West Timor, action covered a distance of little more than 30 miles over a few months whereas the commandos on East Timor operated for about 10 months and covered a much larger area.
